# Tegg's Nose and Macclesfield Forest

**Start** Tegg's Nose Country Park, signposted from Macclesfield off Buxton Road

**Distance** 8½ miles (13.7km).  
Shorter walk 7½ miles (12km)

**Height gain** 1,855 feet (565m).  
Shorter option 1,690 feet (515m)

**Approximate time** 4½ hours. Shorter option 4 hours

**Parking** Visitor centre car park (Pay & Display)

**Route terrain** Lanes, rough tracks, field paths. Very hilly with many ups and downs, some steep. Boggy in places in wet weather

**Dog friendly** Obey locally posted signs during the lambing season (on leads Jan–May). There are many stiles on the route

**Ordnance Survey maps** Landranger 118 (Stoke-on-Trent & Macclesfield), Explorer OL24 (The Peak District – White Peak area)

*After an initial descent, rise through Macclesfield Forest to the Forest Chapel. The remainder of the route is undulating and there are likely to be some muddy stretches. The last 1¼ miles (2km) is along the Gritstone Trail. The full walk includes a short additional stretch at the end to Tegg's Nose. This is quite a strenuous walk with lots of climbs and descents, sometimes over rough ground, and it is not advisable to attempt it in bad weather, especially in mist, unless experienced in walking in such conditions and able to navigate using a compass.*

 Start by taking the paved downhill path, signposted Saddlers Way, go through a gate and continue down to a lane. Keep ahead downhill and after going round a sharp left bend in front of the entrance to Clough House **A**, the lane becomes first an enclosed track and then an uphill, enclosed path.

The path bends right, heads downhill to ford a stream and continues uphill.

At the top, turn left along another enclosed path and in front of a farm, turn right along a narrow lane. Follow it around a left bend to a metal hand-gate on the right at a public footpath fingerpost **B**.

Enter Macclesfield Forest here, commencing a steady climb through the woods. This part of the forest is a delightful mix of conifers and

track and where it bends left, pass beside a gate and walk along a straight, fence-lined path towards the buildings of Dunham Massey.

Climb a ladder stile to enter Dunham Park and keep ahead along a tarmac drive to a fork in front of the Hall **C**. Dunham Massey Hall was built for the Earl of Warrington in the 18th century and remodelled in the early 20th century. It is noted for the richness of the interior and the fine collections of furniture, silver and paintings. There are colourful gardens and the surrounding deer park, laid out in the early 18th century, has some impressive avenues.


At the fork, take the right-hand drive and continue across the deer park, curving left to a lodge. Climb a ladder

stile onto a road, **D** turn left and take the first lane on the right. At a footpath fingerpost take the kissing-gate on the right and follow the wide path ahead across the field to a waymarked post, here turn left along the right-hand side of the field. Climb a stile onto a lane, turn right and at a public footpath sign, turn left over a stile and walk across a field to a waymarked post on the far side. Turn left **E** along an enclosed path, pass beside a fence and continue to a road in Dunham Town which, despite its name, is only a hamlet.

Turn right along School Lane, shortly passing by the **Axe & Cleaver** pub. Remain on the lane to cross the canal bridge **F**, turn sharp right down a path and through a kissing-gate onto the

sides. Cross the old brick railway bridge in trees; then beyond the gate, head up the right edge of three pastures to reach a corner with two field gates. Use the right-hand one (bridleway disc) and turn left to accompany the hedgerow to the distant timber-framed cottage. Turn right along the lane to reach the (closed) Blue Bell Inn **E**.

Turn left along the road and walk round a left-hand bend. As this straightens, take the hedged track on the right, walking through to the nearby very busy A41 road. Cross directly over to join a 'Dead End' tarred lane. Walk to

the end of this and use the kissing-gate on the right, heading then along the dirt track across the pasture towards a brick-built church. This is old St Chad's Church, built in 1689 on the site of an earlier timber-framed building. When a new church was built  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile (800m) away in 1863 to serve the parish of Tushingham, the old church was left standing in the fields on its own.

About 100 yards before reaching the church **F**, turn left and head across the field to a stile. Climb it, keep ahead
